Remote Digital Access to Microfilm

Just over a year ago, Curt Witcher, Allen County Library at Fort Wayne, IN spoke at the Ohio Genealogical Society conference about the future capability of e-mailing the staff to load a certain roll of microfilm on a reader, they would e-mail back a code, and then you would have access to that microfilm from home. He warned not to advance past the end of the roll, however, since it would take human intervention to put it back on.

This same idea has been implemented at the L.S.U. in Baton Rouge. The remote access allows patrons to view, print, scan, and e-mail images from microfilm. This remarkable service for \$20/session fee is available Monday through Thursday and sessions are from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. the following day (the machine that is used for this service is thus available to on-site researchers during the day).

Safety Tips

A glimpse into the life of

My g-grandfather, Caleb Rose Davis was a wiry little Irishman, at 5' 7" and about 145 lbs. On November 6, 1843 he was born to Elizabeth (Rose) and Joseph Davis, in Richland Township, Guernsey County, Ohio. He worked and lived in that county most of his life, except when he went off to fight in the Civil War and then spent some time in the western United States following his invalid discharge.

Caleb entered the war in 1861 and mustered out in 1865, private from beginning to end. He fought in the Battle of Mission Ridge, received a minor wound and pneumonia for his bravery. He picked up the pneumonia while on picket duty. He spent time recovering in an Army hospital, went back to battle only to suffer a recurrence of the pneumonia. This time it stayed and part of his request for invalid pension years later was based on the breathing problems from this pneumonia. The marches were hard on everyone, with little to eat and certainly no fresh fruit or vegetables. He suffered the after effects of that the rest of his life and the other part of his pension was from this disability.

He married three times, the first to Margaret Thompson while he was in Nebraska after the war. They had two boys before they left Nebraska where I assume they met. They divorced after he brought her home to Ohio. I haven't pursued that line.

His second wife was my g-grandmother Eliza Jane Strong. She, Eliza gave him six children, my grandmother and wonderful Uncle Wilbert (grandma's baby brother) among them. Eliza died in 1906 at 57.

His last marriage was to Catharine Orr or Barnett. In the widow's pension records she is Barnett and Orr. Catharine with an "A" was something she was fussy about. She fought as hard to receive her widow's pension as he did to gain his invalid pension.

Caleb's father was Joseph Davis and his mother was Elizabeth Rose, according to family story. Both were born in Fayette County, Pennsylvania. Joseph was a day laborer. He never owned any land according to the censuses. Tombstones in the Senecaville Cemetery (Ohio) close to Caleb are for Benjamin Rose and Dilley. Perhaps those are Elizabeth's mother and father.

Caleb was buried a Free Methodist, which explains why grandma (Mary Elizabeth Davis Moorhead) was not in favor of drinking, dancing or cards..

Caleb's brother Joshua had a little farm in Richland Township, near Caleb. It appears that his sisters stayed in Ohio as well. MaryLu Metz-Glendale

The Society's year ending December 31, 2007 shows an increase in assets of \$1887.49. Income decrease by \$952.23 due in large part to less membership dues collected. The expenses were significantly lower because of lower cost of producing and distributing the Society's Newsletter. Other savings were found in chapter expenses and the Fall Seminars. History of Naturalization Laws

The first naturalization law was created on March 26, 1790. This law provided that aliens to the United States could apply for citizenship provided that they were “free white persons” of “good moral character” and lived for two years in the United States plus one year in the state in which they were living. If they met those qualifications they could file for a Petition for Naturalization. He would take an oath of allegiance and become a citizen.

The Act of 1795 required that aliens had to live in the United States for five years and two in the state of residence. This act now required an extra step, the Declaration of Intention. The immigrants had to go their local court and complete the declaration of intention or “first papers.” This had to be completed three years prior to the formal application for citizenship.

The Naturalization Act of 1798 required that aliens had to live in the United States for fourteen years and aliens from countries that were at war with the United States were prohibited from applying for naturalization. This law was repealed in 1802 and the residency laws of 1795 were reinstated. The Act of April 14, 1802 also provided that aliens had to present two witnesses that could verify their time of residence within the United States.

It is important to point out two deviations from the two-step process. The Act of May 26, 1824 pertained to minor naturalizations. Immigrants, who came to the United States and were under the age of 18 at the time, could become citizens upon turning 21 years of age and after five years of residence. The Act of July 17, 1862 allowed veterans who served during wartime to become citizens. Both of these acts did not require the Declaration of Intention.

An Act in 1855 allowed alien women to acquire citizenship by marrying a United States citizen, or upon his naturalization. A woman’s citizenship was directly tied to that of her husband. Women and children automatically received naturalization upon the husband or father’s naturalization. In 1907 a law was passed that took citizenship away from women if they married alien men. In 1922 women’s citizenship was considered separate.

Until 1906, there were too many variations in the naturalization procedure. The Naturalization Act of June 29, 1906 declared standard fees and forms and created the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization. This act also required proficiency of the English language. Jurisdiction over naturalization had

changed hands numerous times. The Secretary of the Treasury oversaw it from 1882 to 1891 when the Superintendent of Immigration office was created within the Treasury Department. Jurisdiction was later moved to the Department of Labor. In 1940 it was again transferred to the Department of Justice under the office of Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS).

In 2003 the Immigration and Naturalization service moved to the Department of Homeland Security and became the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services. Forwarded by Roseann Hein-Fountain Hills

QUESTION MADE TO EDITOR

Margaret-is this of interest to FHSA newsletter? March 24, 2008 page A22 New York Report of *The New York Times* “Searching by Number for Loved Ones in New York’s Potter’s Field.” The article by Cara Buckley plus pictures covered two-thirds of a page.

It tells of Melinda Hunt, a New York City artist who has devoted more than a decade to helping people track down the Hart Island dead. Quoting from the article —

“Hart Island is home to New York City’s potter’s field, the place where hundreds of thousands of the city’s anonymous, indigent and forgotten have been laid to rest, tightly packed in pine coffins in common graves. Hart Island is managed by the city’s Department of Correction, and inmates dig and fill the graves—three bodies deep for adults, five deep for babies—and mark each trench with a numbered concrete block. The island is off limits to the public, though family members who can prove their relatives are buried there are able to arrange visits.”
